Softening the gelatin in the cold water for 5 minutes, add the hot coffee, sugar, and a few grains of salt, and stir until the gelatin and sugar have dissolved.

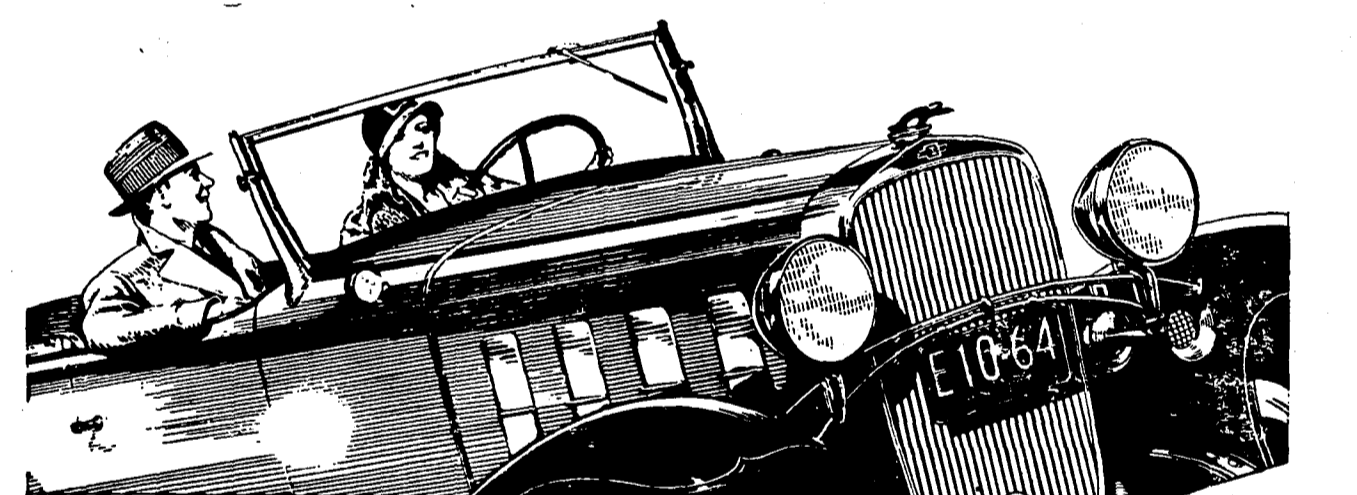
